MORE TROUBLE FROM OUR PALS IN WASHINGTON

Subject: Legislative Leason Buletin 83-2; Domestic Content Legislation

This is to inform the membership that a pair of bills pending in congress, which, if passed would force most foreign car manufactures to provide for a certain percentage of U.S. content in either material or labor, for all cars sold in the United States.

Most manufacturers are not in a position to do so. (Porsche included.) While Porsche would not be affected immediatly by these bills, since they are considered part of the Volkswagen organization in the U.S. and VW would meet the present domestic requirements. Porsche could possibly be affected in the near future.

We urge you to write your Senator and Congressman. Tell him you oppose these bills, and urge him to vote against them. A short note will do very well. If you want to give a reason, simply state that these bills do nothig but arbitarily remove foreign competition that is healthy for the auto industry. The U.S. consumer deserves a wide choice. These bills are a "bandaid" approach to trying to repair the ailing U.S. auto industry.

Tech Tips / Gassin' with The Bean sid Jepson

We've talked about this before, but it's important enough to bear repeating:

Fuel contamination affects all cars but it is disasterous to CIS injection systems. 911s '73-'83, 924s, 928s, etc. Moisture and impurities can cause fuel starvation, poor running and corrosion of the injector parts, mainly the fuel distributor (spelled E-X-P-E-NS-I-V-E). In some cases fuel filters can plug so much that they blow completely through and contaminate the whole system.

Impurities can also overload the electric fuel pump and ruin it.

Obviously, then it's very important to keep a CIS system free of foreign matter. How? 1. Change fuel filters often (cut the recommended interval in half, at least.) 2 Add a can of Swepco 503 every six tanks of fuel. 3. Always refill the tank with a few gallons left in it. This will avoid picking up water and sediment that accumulates at the bottom of the tank.

4. If you store your car or let it sit for extended periods of time, you should store it with a full tank of gas. This prevents condensation. 5. Be careful of Gasahol and alot of the new premium fuel that use alcohol as an octane booster. The alcohol will put any water into suspension so that it can get into the injection system and cause corrosion.

CIS injection is normally a very good, trouble free system. Hopefully, these suggestions will help you keep it that way.

I mentioned Swepco 503 as an additive. There are many good gas treatment products on the market that are no doubt as good as this. However, while Bosche doesn't recommend any product, they say "If you must use an additive, Swepco would be the one to use."

Des Moines Mazda Porsche Audi now stocks Swepco, which is a handy place to get it.




Dr. Zig-Zag (JeffLammert) made the most of the Pat Clemons Chevy-Buick lot with a twisty/tricky course.

ADVENTURES IN PARADISE OR THE LE MANS EXPERIENCE

How should I approach this report on the World's Biggest Race? The Le Mans 24 Hour is one leg of motor racing's Triple Crown, the others being the Monte Carlo Grand Prix and, of course, the Indy 500.


While I've never attened the other two, I've spent enough time at other courses around North America to be able to draw some comparisons:

First, the town of Le Mans is bigger than I expected; Watkins Glen is much smaller, like Pella, where as Le Mans is more the size of Ames. There is some industry there. In fact, the Rondeau race cars are manufactured there. The course covers a huge area. Being 8.467 miles around the infield contains a number of private homes, restaurants and a full size golf course. Also, it holds the smaller Bugatti circuit and several tracks for go-cart racing.

One thing that we Americans noted was the lack of crowd control of which we have become accustomed to at Stateside tracks. Spectators were actually climbing over the railing aroud the pit balcony to sit on the overhang above the pits. What a fire would have done to their backsides!

The cost was very reasonable, as far as big time racing goes; for two of us, with camping and special "Welcome Area" passes plus general admission, the cost was 530 Francs. At 7.5 Francs to the dollar: \$70.67. Food and "trinkets" were also reasonably priced.

Speaking of trinkets, the "goody stores" streched the full



length of the padock behind the pits. . . about a quarter mile or so. On the outside of the course, across the famous Donlop bridge, a full scale carnival played on into the night. I didn't ride the Ferris Wheel as none of my companions were to excited about the height!

But what about the race, you ask? Porsche won, of course! They took first through eight places, a Le Mans record for marques. Americans Hurley Haywood and Al Holbert with factory perennial Vern Shuppan managed to keep ahead of last year's winners Jacky Ickx and Derek Bell, who were closing within a minute or so at the end of the 24th hour. Mike and Mario Andretti made us proud with their third place showing. Only their fuel consumption problems kept them from racing for the top spot.


